Statement of Faith by Rev. Ana Loyda Lugo-Berríos

I believe in God, the creator almighty. It is thru God's creating energy that all came to be and continues to be for God creates in us a clean heart to live as God's children in this world God has entrusted to us.

God is a parent (mother and father), providing the children with gifts and talents to live as God's children, raising each other up, caring for the Earth, for each other, telling the story of God's love towards all.

God established a covenant with humanity to be our God and for us to be God's people. God raised prophets, teachers, judges, kings, women and men to bring God's children back to the covenant. But we, the children of God, continued to fail. Therefore, God sent the Son.

Jesus, son of God, the bridge between God and humanity, the redeemer. In the Son we see the Love of God towards creation. Jesus' death and resurrection bridged the chasm between God and creation once and for all, reconciling us with God. It is thru his sacrifice on the cross that we have received salvation.

In Jesus we learn how God intended humanity to live, a glimpse of the kingdom of God. Where the last shall be first, where the hungry are fed, the ill healed, where all creatures have enough, where there is justice for those experiencing injustice.

I believe the Scriptures are the inspired Word of God, telling the story of God's relationship with God's children, first with the children of Israel and then with all nations. When we gather around the communion table, we are nourished for our service, we remember our Lord's sacrifice and we get a glimpse of the Kingdom where all nations will come form East and West, from North and South to sit at table. In baptism, God welcomes us into the kingdom just as we are and we promise, as a Christian community help raise the newly baptized in the faith. Both sacraments are public so that entire body of Christ is nourished and strengthened for serice.

Journey of Faith by Rev. Ana Loyda Lugo-Berríos

I grew up in a Presbyterian home. But my faith heritage goes back to my great-grandparents in the mountains of Puerto Rico. When Puerto Rico became a territory of the United States as a result of the Spanish-American war of 1898, the mission field was open to the reformed tradition. My great-grandparents embraced the reformed faith early in the 20th century and they experienced their community's ostracism for leaving the mother church. They taught the faith to my grandmother, who in turn taught the faith to my mother. My mother married my father, a Presbyterian pastor in Puerto Rico. I am product of that home, product of the mission field.

I became church leader during my teens, teaching Sunday School, leading youth groups, singing and preaching. I was a leader in Puerto Rico's synodical youth. Those were wonderful years, gathering annually and semiannually with youth from all over the island. It was during my college years I began the process of discerning my call to the ministry of word and sacrament. I always thought I would follow a scientific path, either in Biology or medicine even as I was very involved with my local church and the Presbyterian youth. In the end, when the time came to make a decision, I trusted God's call to serve as an ordained pastor.

I graduated form the University of Puerto Rico at Mayagüez in 1981 with a bachelor's degree in Biology and Chemistry. I enrolled at San Francisco Theological Seminary in San Anslemo, CA and received my Master in Divinity in 1985. I served my internship year at Fort Washington Heights Presbyterian Church in New Your City under the supervision of the Rev. Idalisa Fernández, the first women ordained in Cuba by the Methodist Church. I sought Rev. Fernández on purpose for I figured a woman like her would have a lot to teach and wisdom to impart to a new comer like myself.

My first call was a co-pastorate in the Presbytery of Denver, CO. I served as co-pastor to Bethel Presbyterian Church in Denver, CO and El Buen Pastor Presbyterian Church Brighton, CO for seven years. These were the only two Hispanic congregations of the Presbytery. During those years I met brothers and sisters like me, whose faith journey started with mission workers who went to the fields to preach the gospel, heal the sick and teach, for Presbyterian mission workers would start a school, a clinic, and a church wherever they went. At the same time, it was eye-opening so learn how different our experiences had been. During this time, I served in numerous Presbytery, Synod and General Assembly committees and task forces.

In 1992 we moved to Dumas, TX and I began my service with Church Financial Campaign Services, a service of the General Assembly lodged in the (old) Stewardship Ministry Unit. For 20 years I assisted congregations with capital campaign, raising funds for new construction, remodeling and/or restoring present structures, and debt reduction. I learned first hand about God's children financial generosity when their efforts and energies are focused on a project. I also assisted with annual campaigns when these drives were done concurrently. During those 20 years I worked with over 200 congregations, helping them raise over \$80 million. At the

same time, I assisted and advised the congregations my ex-husband was serving as a pastor with their annual campaigns.

In June of 2013 I accepted the positions of Gift Planner for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) Foundation for the Florida-Bahamas Synod. Palo Duro Presbytery validated this call as our denominations are full communion partners. The FL-BH Synod is comprised of 178 organized congregations with 54,553 baptized members. In this position I am responsible for identifying, cultivating, soliciting and securing new and ongoing gifts from individuals in support of churchwide ministries, congregations, synods and related ELCA ministries. I continue to be amazed by God's people generosity, this time to continue to bless families, institutions, and ministries they have supported in life with their legacy gifts. Sometimes I am invited to preach and when I accept, often I will administer the sacrament of communion as part of worship.

When I'm not on the road, doing my job on weekends, you'll find me teaching an adult Sunday School class at South Jacksonville Presbyterian Church and singing with the choir. I have been teaching this Sunday Scholl class since 2011 and singing in the choir since 2001.

Faith Journey Statement 11/14/2017

James Kendrick

If a journey means getting from one place to another I must start with the present and work backward to the starting point. As of this moment I am at the place where I begin to discern God's intentions for the rest of my life. Having arrived at this point, I am drawn closer to the idea of pastoral ministry than I ever thought I might be. The past eight to nine years have not been what I would call overly spiritual, yet all of the work of seminary and worship internships and Clinical Pastoral Education were steeped in spirituality. It all just seemed like work at the time.

My experience of Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) is probably the primary reason that I am considering a call to pastoral ministry. Prior to CPE I always thought I would end up using my secular skills from the swimming pool industry to find my way into a clean water ministry. Another option was, and is to work with people like myself, who had, or have a negative view of the institutional church. CPE had a profound impact in teaching me what it meant just to be with people, any person, in possibly one of the worst moments of life. I learned to be compassionate, often silently and exhibit the grace and love that Jesus gave

the world through his life, death and resurrection.

Before my rotation of CPE I viewed most of my tasks (that is how I viewed them) in the ordination process as boxes to be checked off or hurdles to be cleared. While sometimes I still get those feelings in the back of my mind, I now understand the process and appreciate the reasoning behind the process toward ordination. Since this path toward ordination has been my focus for almost the last decade, it has in many ways become a spiritual journey itself.

Having shunned the church and organized religion from about age twelve to the age of twenty-eight I am still somewhat of a novice when it comes to being a faithful Christian. That being said I quickly grasped Christian life in the way Jesus himself described it in the Great Commandment in the Gospel of Matthew: "Love God and love your neighbor as yourself." Prior to age twenty-eight I definitely did not model the type of behavior in that commandment. So for the purposes of this exercise I could point to this time period as a beginning to my faith journey. The more I grow into the Great Commandment, truly learning to love God, by first loving myself (read that as personal growth) and loving my neighbor, the more I feel called to ministry in some sort of pastoral setting.

This journey has been difficult, at times painful to the point of just wanting to give up. At the same time it has been ultimately rewarding, exciting and joyful. Throughout it all I felt God's presence leading me from one point to the next and as the journey continues I trust God continues to be my guide.

Presbytery of St. Augustine Memorial Resolution The Rev. James R. Lloyd 1931 – 2018

The Rev. James R. Lloyd, a member of the Presbytery of St. Augustine, died on February 26, 2018, in the Taylor Care Center of Jacksonville, Florida, where he had been a resident in the memory-care unit for several years. He was 86.

Rev. Lloyd was a Presbyterian minister for 61 years. He was also a gifted musician. At the young age of just 14 years old he was ASKED to become a member of the Duke University Symphony Orchestra, where he played the cello for eight years: from junior high school days until he and his wife Margaret graduated from Duke.

Following his graduation from Duke, Rev. Lloyd earned his Master's Degree from Union (Presbyterian) Theological Seminary in Richmond, Virginia. He later pursued a Doctorate in Preaching at Drew University in Madison, New Jersey. He had completed all of the required classes and needed only the Practical Application Project to complete the degree. At the same time, however, his wife Margaret had begun work on her doctorate in School Psychology. After much introspection and prayer, they decided to stop pursuing these degrees in order to give more time to their family and to their other interests.

Rev. Lloyd began his ministry in North Carolina as Pastor of the Park Ave. Presbyterian Church in Rockingham and of the Mt. Bethel Presbyterian Church in Durham (where he had grown up). He entered this Presbytery in 1965, when he was called to Jacksonville's Lakewood Presbyterian Church as Assistant Pastor. Subsequently he served as Associate Pastor at our Arlington Church, and Pastor of our Covenant (Jacksonville) church, and our Mikesville (near Lake City) church, from which he retired in 1997.

A number of years ago, under the auspices of this presbytery, he gathered a small group of Presbyterians and held worship services, church school classes, and activities in the Elks Lodge in Middleburg, Florida. From that small group emerged the thriving Middleburg Presbyterian Church of today. For eight years, Rev. Lloyd was the Pastor of First Presbyterian Church in St. Marys, Georgia.

Rev. Lloyd happily and ably participated in camps and conferences at Montgomery Conference Center in Florida and annually spent a week at Montreat Conference Center in North Carolina, where each member of his family participated in the classes and activities.

Rev. Lloyd served a term as Vice President of the Florida Association of Christian Educators and a term on the Board of Directors of the Presbyterian Counseling Center of Jacksonville. He represented this Presbytery as a Commissioner to the 1983 General Assembly, which reunited the General Assemblies of the southern Presbyterian churches and the northern Presbyterian churches.

Through his preaching of the Word and his living the Christian way of life, he guided persons to know and love Christ. Throughout his life he was deeply interested in helping the less fortunate, particularly the homeless and those who felt helpless or hopeless.

Rev. Lloyd is survived by his wife of 61 years, Margaret, his daughter Melanie Thompson (John), grandchildren Stephanie/ Heather/ Jeremy, and great-grandson Jaxon. He is also survived by his brother Kenneth Lloyd and brother-in-law Ray Vance Hopper. He was predeceased by his son Eric in 2014.

The Presbytery of St. Augustine enters this resolution to thank God for our brother's unique gifts and the many ways he served Jesus Christ with distinction, creativity, hopefulness, and courage. We ask for blessings on his family and on the continued impact that his ministry will have on the many lives that he touched.

Montgomery Presbyterian Conference Center

Lexi Green, Interim Executive Director and Glenn Dickson, Chair of the Executive Operating Board

The following report is provided by Glenn Dickson:

- 1. We recommend that Presbytery authorize the Montgomery Center Board to complete the three year capital funds campaign that the Board began after Presbytery voted unanimously at the 2017 winter meeting at the Fort King Church in Ocala to authorize it. If every member of our Presbytery gave just \$25 PER YEAR for this year and the following two years, we could easily pay off the debt. WE INVITE ALL OF YOU TO MAKE A COMMITMENT TO THIS VITAL MINISTRY.
- 2. We encourage every church to celebrate Montgomery Day on June 3rd and to receive a love offering for this ministry and to pray for the Center. We will provide information about the Montgomery Center and will be glad to provide speakers if you request.
- 3. We would like to host the August 25 meeting of Presbytery.
- 4. We are here to serve the churches of our Presbytery and will be glad to help you plan a retreat or event here. South Jacksonville, Westminster, Fernandina Beach, and Presbyterian Women have held events here this year and in March nearly 100 people participated in a youth retreat.
- 5. Our summer registration is going well and we urge you to register soon.
- 6. We also minister to churches and organizations in North Central Florida such as First Baptist of Starke, Church of Our Savior Youth Retreat, Bradford Pet Care, Hands 2 Love (an organization aiding children with hand differences and their families), Jesus People Living Word, Concierge Home Care Employee Retreat, and others. We anticipate increased use of the Center in the months ahead.
- 7. We have been holding conversations with the College of Missionary Aviation regarding the possible sale or lease of 40 acres of our property lying along SR 100, land that we don't use for our programs. A member of the Trustees and two members of the Task Force on Montgomery as well as members of the Montgomery Board have been participating in these conversations. Any decision will have to be approved by the Montgomery Board, the Trustees and the Presbytery.
- 8. Due to the uncertainty about the future of the Montgomery Center our Director, Terry Patterson, resigned at the end of February and in April our office manager, Kris Weaver, also resigned for the same reason. Our staff is working well together and doing an excellent job. They are: Lexi Green, Interim Executive Director; Zach Leopold, Hospitality Director; Doris Tyler, Food Service Director; Mat Ware and Trevor Crews, Maintenance.

Report of PW Moderator for Presbytery May 2018 Meeting Gayle Anne Bone

Since taking office on January 27, 2018 I have tried to improve communication from the Presbytery level to the church level. I have begun a periodic newsletter called, "Moderator's Musings", which I send to the Regional Coordinators to be forwarded to the church PWs. In this way I can communicate information in a timely manner. I have also attended a tea at San Mateo church organized by the Regional Coordinator, Betty (BJ) Johns, in order to recharge the PW group at the church. It was a success with thirteen women attending.

With these methods I hope to help women see the importance of being a connectional church and accept opportunities to serve above the church level. I also wish to serve the churches I represent by giving them timely information.

Since Days for Girls is the Together in Service mission chosen, I asked the Gainesville Days for Girls Director, Radha Selvester, to give an informational workshop at Faith Presbyterian. I contacted Presbyterian Women as well as quilters I knew of within a fifty mile radius. We had forty women attend to learn how they can "Keep Girls in School. Period."

I am preparing to attend the Churchwide Gathering in Louisville, Kentucky in August as a voting member of the Synod of South Atlantic. I look forward to learning much about how our Presbyterian Women can continue to serve the Lord.

Mutual Mission Report

Spring Stated Meeting – Presbytery of St. Augustine Diane Watkins & Bob Bell, Co-Chairs

Our St. Augustine Mutual Mission exploratory/discernment team spent 7 days in Cuba in February. The team included Rev. Wain Wesberry, Diane and Mike Watkins, Bobbi Newland (all from First Fernandina), Bob Bell (First Perry), Pat Crews (Middleburg), Martha Shaffer (Hodges Boulevard), and Terry Blaes (Dunnellon). Rev. Nigel Pusey represented our JEMM partners.

During our time in Cuba, the team visited the three Presbyteries which make up the IPRC—or Reformed Presbyterian Church in Cuba. These are the Central Presbytery, the Matanzas Presbytery, and the Havana Presbytery. Within each Presbytery we were able to visit approx. 5 congregations (less than half), and talked with the pastors and church members, learning what the congregations are doing, and how we might best be able to partner with them. We also visited their camp (located in the Central Presbytery), and seminary (located in the Matanzas Presbytery). At each location, we were welcomed warmly with hugs and kisses, as well as refreshments. At the seminary, we were able to meet with PC(USA) mission co-workers David Cortes-Fuentes and Josey Saez Acevedo.

The team feels very strongly that we should continue the process of discerning if this is the right time for a relationship to be formed with our Cuban brothers and sisters, and how that relationship may look. The Cuban church is very direct that they want our friendship much more than our financial resources. Developing a partnership will take time. We recommend the following as 'next steps'. SAMM will send at least 2 people to the Cuba Partners Network Gathering this fall in Leesburg, FL. Additionally, we suggest planning a second trip to Cuba, to visit with all of the churches in the Matanzas Presbytery, in 2019. Spending time in a single presbytery will allow the team to go deeper into relationship building, and the group unanimously felt drawn to this presbytery.

We currently have 4 youth registered for our Jamaican youth exchange trip in July—but we desperately need at least one adult leader for the trip. This an expenses paid trip for 12 days—July 13-23.
